The upper-division – Issues – component of the General Education Program is designed to develop your ability to draw on previous knowledge and experience, collaborate with others, and address problems that connect to important world issues:

INSTRUCTIONS:

- This document, and your essay must be submitted to <u>gened@qvsu.edu</u> within <u>60 days</u> of your return from studying abroad! If it is past 60 days, please contact <u>gened@qvsu.edu</u>.
- In the email <u>subject line</u> please put: Reflection your name (for example: Reflection Joan Smith)
- This document must be between <u>1-2 pages</u>, single spaced.
- <u>Select 1 of the 6 Issues</u> listed above (you can pick one of the topics underneath the broader Issue, just be sure to list both the Issue and the specific topic). Reflect on the entirety of your experience abroad including your course work and out of course experiences (for example, sight-seeing, mass transportation, lodging, encounters with other people in the country, buying food, etc.).
- Once your reflection has been reviewed, you and Records will receive an email approval that will allow you to use the courses to fulfill your Issues requirement.
- **Exclusions:** Independent study, independent research, and independent readings cannot be used towards the Issues requirement. Also, GVSU faculty-led program participants must take two courses abroad that are from two different disciplines, otherwise, only one course can be used to fulfill the Issues requirement.

Courses taken abroad that are used to fulfill the Issues General Education requirement <u>cannot</u> be used to fulfill a General Education Foundations requirement. Students must choose between fulfilling the Issues requirement <u>or</u> fulfilling a Foundations requirement.
