Two (2) Supplemental Writing Skills (SWS) courses are required with a grade of C or better.

Students must have a minimum of 120 credits to graduate. At least 58 credits must be from a senior level (4-year) institution and the final 30 credits must be from GVSU.

Math Placement:

Students can be placed in math based off SAT/ACT scores, the GVSU math placement test, AP credits or transfer credit. Students who place into MTH 180 should take MTH 180-Part 1 in the fall of their first year and MTH 180-Part 2 in the winter of their first year. Students who place into MTH 110 should take MTH 110 in either the fall or winter of their first year. Students who place out of MTH 110 will not need to take MTH 110 or MTH 180.

Writing Requirements:

Students who self-place into WRT 120 should take this course in the fall semester and then take WRT 130 in the winter semester of their first year. Students who self-place into WRT 150 can take the course in either fall or winter. Students will not need to take WRT 150 if they have earned credit for the course through AP/Dual Enrollment. A grade of C or better is required in WRT 120/130 or 150 in order to satisfy the WRT requirement at GVSU.
