CANDIDACY REQUIREMENTS

The Social Work major is a secondary admission program, which only admits students one time per year. This means that although students have been admitted to GVSU, they must meet certain criteria before being admitted into the School of Social Work (also called candidacy). All Social Work majors who will satisfy the candidacy requirements listed below prior to program entry, must formally apply for candidacy into the School of Social Work's baccalaureate program prior to the application deadline for fall semester entry. To be eligible for Candidacy students must have:

1. **A minimum cumulative GPA of 2.500 on a 4.000 scale.**

Qualified transfer students applying for admission into the School of Social Work prior to establishing a GPA at GVSU will be considered based on the minimum 2.500 GPA necessary for transfer student admission to GVSU.

2. **Completion of the following components of the general education curriculum:**

- a. All Foundation Categories; except Mathematical Sciences; Students must be MTH 110 proficient
